To promote their functional existence in the School, at least, each department should strive to publish, in subsequent issues of the journal.

Finally, we would like to thank and acknowledge the authors of the papers herein for the tremendous effort they exerted in their research and production of these papers. Your effort emphasizes the fulfilment for which the College of Natural Resources and Environmental Studies was established – to produce graduates to do research on the services that the natural resources could provide to the inhabitants of the South Sudan so that these services would be utilized sustainability.
